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

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


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Welcome!

The section also includes Judson Press's Christian education catalog and a photocopiable litany for Christian Education Sunday (September 25) in English, Traditional Chinese, French and Spanish.

Forming new followers of Jesus and nurturing growth in existing ones is complex and challenging in this postmodern, post-Christendom era. At the same time, this season of rapid, discontinuous change provides new and exciting opportunities to reclaim and proclaim authentic faith in ways that capture the minds and hearts of those outside the church.

While we often have sentimental attachments to our church traditions, many of them are recent phenomena. For example, the Sunday School Movement, which arose outside of the church in response to challenges of the Industrial Revolution and morphed into the twentieth-century church's primary tool for Christian education, has been around for less than three hundred years of Christianity's more than two-thousand-year history. That movement, however, witnesses to the timeless truth that responsiveness to changing external contexts and internal circumstances is essential to the continuation and spread of the gospel. In fact, according to church historian and phenomenologist Marianne Sawicki, the ability to change is one of the most conventional aspects of our Christian heritage:

The most traditional thing about the [early] Christian churches is their adaptability, their readiness to change to accommodate new needs in new times, while preserving—more or less faithfully to be sure!—their continuity with the message and work of Jesus Christ.*

It is important not to miss the irony here! While the Christian church rests on ancient tradition, which we might be inclined to preserve by insulating ourselves from change, the ability to be *untraditional* is essential to that very tradition. Adaptability makes possible preservation of the tradition for each new age and context.

Our prayer is that this resource and all ABHMS's discipleship offerings will help faith communities become more responsive and more willing to experiment with new ways of initiating and nurturing faith in Jesus. Never has the world been in more need of the presence and witness of authentic followers of Jesus. As always, we appreciate feedback. The Theme | Handling the Word of Truth

In Animal Ethics and the Nonconformist Conscience (Palgrave Macmillan, 2018), Philip J. Sampson introduces the notion of a "nomadic" Christian tradition that exists in the broader Western culture, vestiges of Christian concepts that retain force in the public sphere. Sampson proposes that the presence of this fragmentary Christian tradition is sufficient permission to address it. I would go further, however, and propose that its presence requires us to address—and correct—it when necessary.

In many cases, misappropriations of biblical concepts have become popular parlance. Of even greater concern, it is often these misappropriations rather than solid biblical scholarship that inform the understandings of church folk. Consider, for example, the notion of going the extra mile, which in common usage suggests making an extra effort on a task or for another person. By leaving out the details of the verse, which reads: "If anyone forces you to go one mile, go with them two miles" (Matthew 5:41, emphasis added), the admonition has been reduced to niceness rather than being a subversive tactic for those under the thumb of an oppressive regime. The Roman Empire allowed soldiers to force locals to carry their loads for one mile. By going two miles, oppressed subjects would put soldiers in the untenable position of violating the law, making it nonviolent resistance to an unjust practice. Or consider the popular notion that Mary Magdalene was a prostitute when, in fact, according to the Gospels, she was a woman who had been healed by Jesus, a woman of substance who supported his ministry, a disciple who traveled as part of Jesus' entourage, and among the first to witness and proclaim the resurrection (Matthew 27:55-56; 28:1-8; Mark 15:40-41; 16:1-8; Luke 8:1-3; 23:55; 24:1-12; John 20:1-18). How often the word of Franco Zeffirelli or Bill O'Reilly is taken as gospel rather than the Gospels themselves! Allowing cultural adaptations or contemporary concepts to guide our understanding is just one way we do a disservice to the sacred traditions we call scripture.

For first-century Jesus followers, the oral and written traditions that became our Bible addressed practical day-today questions, such as, "How do we make sure everyone gets a fair share of our limited food supplies?" (See Acts 6:1-7); "Can we do business with people who have beliefs different from ours?" (1 Corinthians 8:1-13); and "What do we do about stupid people?" (1 Peter 2:15). As Christians, we depend on these same traditions to teach us what it means to walk with Jesus. Therefore, the Bible demands reverence, a reverence that honors it with intentional, quality study.

The three articles on pages 4–8 address commonly misappropriated or misunderstood texts to reclaim their power to transform individual lives and the world itself. Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Haggray takes us on the dangerous journey down the Jericho Road in "Who Is My Neighbor?" Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Johnson considers anew Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well in "The UnFaithful Woman at the Well," and Rev. Dr. Cassandra Williams challenges popular understandings of two Old Testament commandments in "The Vanity of Insisting on Obedience."

"Who Is My Neighbor?" Luke 10:25-37

We often hear news stories about "good Samaritans," people who do some nice deed for others. Unfortunately, this appropriation of Jesus' parable trivializes the radical nature of his response to the question "Who is my neighbor?"—a question that perhaps requires a spiritual, moral and ethical hearing today more than at any time in human history.

The story begins with an encounter with a teacher of Judaic law:

On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"

He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

"You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live." (Luke 10:25-28)



The lawyer's motivations are explicit in the text. He was trying to test Jesus in a public arena. What is not as clear to contemporary readers is the notion of inheriting eternal life. While we often associate it with going to heaven after death, for first-century Jews, the concept of eternal life was held in contrast to fleeting life or a life concerned about everyday things rather than focused on matters of eternal importance. For the lawyer, having eternal life was about a life dedicated to study of the Torah—a privileged lifestyle afforded only a select few (e.g., John 5:39-40). For both the Torah expert and for Jesus, eternal life was something to be experienced in the here and now. What differed between them was the how.

The Torah expert's motivation was further evidenced as he tried to justify himself by asking, "And who is my neighbor?" (v. 29). Jesus responded with what is likely the most well-known of his parables.

"A man was going down from Jerusalem to *Jericho when he was attacked by robbers.* They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have." (Luke 10:29-35)

It is worth reminding ourselves of the bitter tensions between Jews and Samaritans. In contrast to the ethnically pure priest and Levite, who were esteemed members of the Jewish priestly class, Samaritans were descendants of a mixed population resultant from Assyria's importation of people from other lands after the conquest of the northern kingdom. They had opposed the rebuilding of Jerusalem and the temple (Ezra 4:2-5). They worshiped on Mount Gerizim with their own scriptures and rituals. In short, they were considered unclean, socially outcast heretics.

The route the traveler took is also significant. The direct route to Jericho from Jerusalem is northeast through Samaria. However, the traveler went *down* from Jerusalem. That is south and then northeast to Jericho, a longer route commonly taken by Jews to avoid contact with Samaritans. On a visit to Israel years ago, my wife, Shelby, and I drove from Jerusalem to the Dead Sea beside the Jericho Road, which is less a road than a walking trail bordered by trees on both sides—good hiding places for those with bad intentions. This was the path taken by the man.

More than a tale about a random act of kindness, this parable exposes some of the complications associated with loving our neighbors in a dangerous world populated by diverse people. It may feel easy to judge the priest and the Levite, but they had good reasons for not helping. Perhaps the man was a plant, either lying in wait himself or put there by others to trap travelers. If he were dead, touching him would have defiled and disqualified them from their temple responsibilities. What has been optioned by our broader culture as a nice little story about being nice is really a story about the transforming power of God. Original hearers would have been shocked, not just by the identity of the hero—a Samaritan who presumably would have nothing to do with a Jew—but also by what he did.

While the priest and Levite were traveling the same road as the man and chose to move away from him, the Samaritan went to him, likely having seen him from a distance. He was not guided by fear. He was not deterred by the man's appearance, religious affiliation, nationality or status. He was moved by compassion. He didn't see a member of a group that despised him. He saw only a fellow traveler in need. He modified his plans, taking him to a safe place, likely an establishment run by another Jew. He got his hands dirty caring for him overnight, paid the equivalent of two days wages from his own pocket, and left with the promise to return and cover any additional costs.

After telling the story, Jesus tested the lawyer: "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man



who fell into the hands of robbers?" Unable to utter his enemy's name, the lawyer simply said, "The one who had mercy on him." Returning to the initial question of how to inherit eternal life, Jesus offered four simple words: "Go and do likewise."

Who is my neighbor?

- the person down the street with a different political affiliation or socioeconomic status
- the person I shun because I value religious differences over shared humanity
- the person socially isolated by illness or disability and a culture that chooses not to see them
- undocumented immigrants who, just like me, want to provide for their families
- returning citizens who, their debt to society paid, remain incarcerated by stigma, hurdles and social convention

These are the folks Jesus challenges us to love. These are also the folks Jesus challenges us to be loved by. The Jewish traveler was cared for, transported by and shared lodging with one whom his clan deemed an unclean, heretical enemy. While we must ask, "Who is it I won't touch?" every now and then we need to imagine ourselves as the person lying in the ditch and ask ourselves, "Who won't I let touch me? Is there any ethnic, religious, social or ideological group I would resist help from?"

Who is my neighbor? The one who needs me—and the one who helps me. How do I inherit eternal life? By crossing the boundaries of division, difference and otherness. By being a neighbor. It's just that simple. It's just that radical.

The UnFaithful Woman at the Well

Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman (John 4:1-42) can be understood as literal or as allusion. While opposing opinions exist about the meaning of the details of the narrative, one aspect of the story that cannot be questioned is its importance, which is indicated by the sheer number of verses given to it. Even more striking is the length of the dialogue between the Samaritan woman and Jesus. One of the longest in any of the Gospels, this conversation comprises half the story.

Jesus is said to have arrived at the well (v. 6, KJV) at the "sixth hour," a detail that is often interpreted to mean that the woman's lifestyle is an embarrassment and she's hoping to avoid meeting anyone. Kenneth Gangel writes, "About noon the woman came to the well, obviously a social outcast since that hot hour would have been an unlikely time to lug a heavy water jar back into the city" (*Holman New Testament Commentary: John*, p. 74). Why is it that when a Bible passage is not given an explicit bent, we default to neutrality or even to the negative over possible positive interpretations? For

example, nowhere in the story of Nicodemus's nighttime talk with Jesus (John 3:1-21) does it say he came at night for fear of the Jews. Similarly, nowhere in the story of the woman at the well does it say she came at noon for fear of the Samaritans. Yet these stories have been saddled through time with these negative presuppositions.

Isn't it possible that Nicodemus came at night because it was the best time available? Could not the woman have merely come to draw water when she had time available or when her household ran out? Could not the phrase "a woman of Samaria" (v. 7, KJV) infer a person of significance instead of one of sin? The well was not restricted to use during morning or evening hours. With no running water in the homes of that day, coming to the well any time of day could be necessary. Furthermore, the emphasis on the time of day is immediately connected with Jesus' physical condition, his weariness, and not the woman's spiritual condition. And this was not just any well. It is the well where Jacob met his wife, Rachel. At a time when women were not included



in theological discussions, the unnamed Samaritan woman demonstrated the ability to stand on her own theological feet by asking if Jesus was greater than Jacob—an allusion to the encounter some two thousand years earlier. That connection becomes even more explicit when we remember that Jacob's initial meeting with Rachel (Genesis 29:6-12) also took place at midday. Yet, sadly, many fixate on the woman's questionable relationships with men—which isn't a certainty—rather than on her being with Jesus, which certainly is the crux of this passage.

Regarding her marital status, Jesus never identified it as sin. While the Samaritan woman may indeed have been married five times, the text never tells the reader why the marriages were dissolved. We do know that for her to marry again and again, each of the preceding marriages must have ended properly, either by the death of the husband or by male-initiated divorce. A double standard related to divorce characterized ancient Israel and most of its contemporaries throughout the Mediterranean region as C. R. Taber notes in his discussion of divorce in biblical times: "There is no hint in history of a divorce being initiated by a wife" (The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible, p. 244).


If Jesus was referring to a literal cycle of bad relationships, Cassandra Williams has offered this assessment: "The five marriages suggest only that she was obviously unlucky in relationships." Williams went on to point out, "One of three possibilities can explain why the man she was now living with was not her husband (v. 18). She could have been a widow living with her nearest male relative. She could have been a childless widow living with her brother-in-law to provide a progeny for her deceased husband in fulfillment of the Levirate marriage requirement. In that case, they would be married; however, he would not formally be considered her husband. Or she could be living with a man as if they were married (an improbable but commonly endorsed option), which was considered a capital offense, making it unlikely she would even be alive to speak with Jesus. The notion of 'living in sin,' simply did not exist in first-century Palestine" (from a sermon preached at Conklin Avenue Baptist Church, Binghamton, NY, February 5, 2012).

If the relationships are to be understood as symbolic, the husbands could refer to Samaria's collective infidelity that occurred when remnants of the northern tribes of Israel intermarried with peoples relocated from other lands after the Assyrian conquest. Though in large part Samaria was solidly Jewish with the tribes of Issachar, Manasseh and Ephraim originally settled there, they accepted the worship of the false gods of five foreign tribes: the Babylonians who

worshiped Marduk, the Cuthites who worshiped Nergal, the people of Avva who worshiped Nibhaz and Tartak, the people of Sepharvaim who worshiped their city gods, and King Hadad who worshiped Anath (2 Kings 17:30-31). Therefore, Jesus could be making a connection with Samaria's past. Within that context, it is not the woman but the country she represents who had five false relationships (religions). This view gains traction when we note the use by Jesus (referred to as a prophet here) of adultery/idolatry imagery—a common metaphor employed in Old Testament prophetic tradition—to call Samaria to worship the one God in spirit and truth (v. 23). A progression is evidenced in her references to Jesus from "a Jew" (v. 9), to "sir" (v. 11), to "a prophet" (v. 19), to "Messiah" (v. 25). A similar spiritual progression in the woman's self-understanding is apparent in her movement from seeker (v. 20—making spiritual inquiries) to believer (v. 25—"I know that Messiah is coming") to disciple (v. 29 encouraging others to believe.

In a presentation titled "The Samaritan Woman at the Well" (February 29, 2020, post on womensordinationcampaign.org), Sister Christine Vladimiroff stated, "The Samaritan woman left her water jar at the well, reminiscent of the

other disciples who left their means of work, fishing nets or tax booths." The woman's testimony likely was one of influence not infidelity. It appears she had a level of respect and rapport with the community, because they simply went with her (v. 30), responding to her invitation to "come, see" Jesus. She didn't have to con-



vince or coerce. All she had to do was extend the invitation. That is evangelism plain and simple. The text doesn't say she was told to go and tell, but she could not keep to herself this life-changing encounter. That is the trademark of a disciple—one who has taken their eyes off themselves and put their eyes on another, specifically on others' spiritual needs. A disciple acts as and is simultaneously a follower (to be so motivated by Jesus) and a leader (to bring the town to Jesus).

An intrinsic value of the story of the Samaritan woman is to establish the full equality of the faith community. It contains powerful lessons for us today about inclusivity in the church and about the role of women as both capable theologians and faithful disciples.

The Vanity of Insisting on Obedience


While several decalogues appear in the Hebrew Bible, the most familiar is found in Exodus 20. Perhaps the most well-known of these commandments, or words, as they are called in Hebrew, are the third (v. 7) and fifth (v. 12), both of which illustrate the risks of partial quotation, neglect of details, and disregard of context when interpreting Scripture.

We must first place these two oft-quoted commandments within their literary and historic context. Exodus 20 begins with "And," indicating that what follows is directly related to the events described in previous chapters, events encapsulated by "I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery" (v. 2). We are dealing with directives specifically given to escaped Hebrew slaves for the purpose of becoming a people who bear witness to the one true God; the core and conditions of their relationship with the God who rescued them.

The prohibition against taking the LORD's name in vain reads in full, "You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD Your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name" (v. 7, NRSV). "LORD" is a replacement for YHWH, the name given in response to Moses' request to know the name of the god who was sending him to lead the slaves out of Egypt (Exodus 3:13). While often translated "I am," there is no scholarly consensus. Alternatives include "I will be what I will be" and "I will be with you." In Moses' time, people believed that knowing gods' names gave them the power to make them present or compel them to act. God's reply to Moses was a renunciation of this magical understanding. Moses was dealing with a divine being who would not be manipulated. Considered holy (that is other) by the Hebrew people, the name was not to be spoken, hence the substitution with "The LORD" or sometimes simply "The Name."

Saying "god" is not taking the LORD's name in vain, because "god" is not God's name. Using God to further one's own agenda is taking God's name in vain, for example, insisting that God wants what we want. The forensic language in the commandment—"The LORD will not acquit"—is a reminder that these are terms of an agreement between God and Israel, which, if breached, would have consequences.

As we turn to the ever popular "Honor your father and your mother" in verse 12, we need to keep in mind that the commandments were addressed to *adults* as sons and daughters of the covenant. The Hebrew *kabbed* does not



mean obey. The word is from the Hebrew root meaning to be heavy. It is used in a negative sense to refer to affliction or being aggrieved, as in the hardening of Pharaoh's heart (Exodus 14:4). It is used in the positive sense to mean to have abundance, glorify, revere, or show honor to, as in Proverbs 3:9: "Honor the LORD with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops."

The neglected remainder of Exodus 20:12, "so that you may live long in the land the LORD your God is giving you," provides important clues to its meaning by reminding us that we are dealing with contractual provisions between two parties. Honoring their "fathers and mothers"—likely a reference to their forebears in the faith—is about keeping the established covenant between God and people who would become a nation called Israel, a requirement for remaining in the land of promise for subsequent generations.

In an ironic twist with grave consequences for children, parents have been taking the LORD's name in vain for centuries, misusing the fifth commandment as support for their desire for children to give unquestioning obedience to them. Repentance is long overdue.


People: Help us to trust the Bible as the word of love that will bring forth life from generation to generation.

Cong: Ayúdanos a corroborar nuestra enseñanza viviendo tu palabra


