As ABHMS and the Center for Continuous Learning (CCL) strive to expand our resources and ministries to support the work of God's people in congregations and communities around the nation, we welcome your input about how best to design and refine resources such as this one to better meet your needs in ministries of discipleship and education.

The Discipleship and Christian Education Guide has evolved over time from its 1995 origin as a Board of Educational Ministries publication called *The Christian Education Planning Guide*. When ABHMS (the Board of National Ministries at that time) took on the ministries of education and discipleship, we rebranded it as *The Planning Guide for Disciple-Making Churches*, and as early as 2006 we began asking about going digital—on CD-ROM! Before too long, we retired the CD option and made the resource available as a PDF document that could be downloaded from the ABHMS website. And in 2016 the resource came full circle in yet another reframing as the *Discipleship and Christian Education Guide*, integrating the Judson Press curriculum (Christian education) catalog.

The question that arises at this moment in time is whether this resource is still meeting the needs of you, our ministry leaders in the areas of faith initiation, faith formation, and the engaging of Jesus followers in the world. With our congregations and communities increasingly tech savvy in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, is a dynamic digital text edition preferred? Is a print resource still needed at all? Would video or audio materials be more valuable? Which of the traditional elements (articles, lectionary readings, calendars, planning pages, teaching tips) are most utilized—and in what ways?

The Theme | Following Jesus in Faithful Finance



—MATTHEW 6:21

Among our team at the ABHMS Center for Continuous Learning, we often say of our work together, "Everything we do is discipleship." By that affirmation we mean that all aspects of our ministry are focused on living out our faith as disciples—followers, learners, imitators—of Jesus.

This inclusive understanding of discipleship encompasses traditional ministries of faith initiation (evangelism) and faith formation (Christian education), *and* it embraces a broader understanding of how Christian identity is conceived and nurtured. That means discipleship through Bible study, prayer, and worship, of course, but also through public witness and advocacy, through community service and volunteerism, as well as through the everyday choices we make about our relationships—with family, friends, coworkers, and caregivers, but also in relating to our time, talents, and treasures.

In 2024 as people across the nation and across diverse communities and socioeconomic brackets experience financial challenges, the theme for the *Discipleship and Christian Education Guide* focuses on an aspect of Christian discipleship that is often a source of discomfort and stress for congregations and church leaders alike: following Jesus in faithful finance.

After all, there is no topic on which Jesus spoke more frequently than matters of finance and stewardship. Economic resources were the analog of many of his parables and the subject of many of his teachings. In his most famous sermon, Jesus offered the reminder that "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21; see also Luke 12:34).

In the pages that follow, you will find articles that explore a faithful approach in three areas vital to ministry leaders: the personal, the pastoral, and the prophetic. The first article, adapted from Shayna Lear Harvey's book *Money on Purpose* (Judson Press, 2012), examines four practical uses of money and how each one of us may be wired differently toward those uses. The insights are critical to developing personal financial literacy and an understanding of how following Jesus in our personal use of money is foundational to providing faithful leadership to God's people individually and corporately.

The second article, written by author and church consultant Margaret Marcuson, offers wisdom to clergy and other ministers related to church finances, beginning with concrete steps toward increasing our comfort level in talking about money—whether in preaching about congregational stewardship or facilitating church business meetings about financial matters.

The third article, written by Curtis Ramsey-Lucas, editor of *Christian Citizen* magazine, models a prophetic example of faithful finance. Originally published in the *Christian Citizen*, this article reflects on the connections between the choices we make about our standard of living and the impact on our climate and natural world.

Connected to each article, we offer recommended resources for further faith formation and education—from the Center for Continuous Learning (CCL), from Judson Press, and from other ABHMS ministry initiatives. As a whole, this issue of the *Discipleship and Christian Education Guide* invites ministry leaders to reflect deeply on their own discipleship as it relates to faithful finance and to consider innovative approaches to increasing financial literacy among God's people. Such ministry efforts may empower individuals to live more abundantly by making choices that are wise *and* generous, faithful *and* financially savvy.

Many of the resources recommended here are available at no cost to you as the learner or leader because ABHMS, through the Center for Continuous Learning, has the privilege of curating the legacy of the In Support of Excellence program, a ministry initiative in financial literacy education and debt relief for clergy, funded through a generous grant from the Lilly Endowment.

Faithful in Personal Finance

Why Do We Have Money?

Many years ago, I was asked to teach a class on money to teenagers. I knew I needed to get down to basics to make the principles of faithful finance accessible to and relevant for them. So I started by asking myself these questions: *What do*



we really do with money? And what do I think teenagers, embarking on the next level of life's journey, need to know about money? Then it hit me. They need to know why.

Why doesn't always have a concrete answer, but it starts us down a path that may lead to an answer. So *why* do we have money?

The most obvious answer is that *we need money to live*. Whether paying our rent or mortgage, buying groceries, or accessing needed utilities, we use money to provide for our daily needs. Money is also a resource we use for our own enjoyment as well as for connecting with other people through giving. As we age, our financial resources become an important focus to secure our future needs and legacy.

We can learn much about how we live as Jesus' disciples by considering the resources, activities, and relationships that form our daily lives. I have found our relationship to money to be a particularly fruitful area for discerning how to follow Jesus. Whether we struggle with scarcity (in spirit or in reality), want to grow in generosity, or simply want to pay our bills with more gratitude, the flow of money into, through, and out of our lives is an everyday opportunity to consider our connection to God and one another.

While planning for the teenagers' class, I began to formulate a financial model that aligns with the Christian faith and informs our daily living as disciples of Jesus. We have money to do four main things: *spend*, *save*, *give*, and *invest*. All of these are valid and biblical uses of financial resources, and the teachings of Scripture can be a helpful filter for all of our financial decisions and actions. Most of us use money in all of these ways at different times in our daily lives or seasons of life. Each of us is oriented toward one or two uses more than the others—so I frame my trainings in terms of "money personalities"—the Saver, Investor, Giver, and Spender.

Whatever our money personality type(s) may be, our financial lives need balance. Having an imbalanced approach to how we use money can lead to financial disaster. Looking at how we use money may offer helpful insights about the areas in which we may need to ask for help.

Savers are great at saving money, but they may be miserly about spending. They may have been raised in poverty or financial instability, so they may be afraid to spend resources on things that feel like luxuries. Savers may need help learning to balance a need for security with the liberty to enjoy the experiences or things that money can buy. The writer of Ecclesiastes urged this kind of balance: "Divide your means seven ways, or even eight, for you do not know what disaster may happen on earth" (11:2).

Investors have a knack of finding ways to have their money make more money. They gain satisfaction in seeing the resources entrusted to them grow and bear fruit for their own benefit and the benefit of others. However, investors may need to learn the value of giving to other people or organizations without expecting financial return. This, too, is a form of investing when all of life is seen as part of God's reign on earth. The biblical witness affirms this principle to prepare for future work and ministry: "Prepare your work outside; get everything ready for you in the field; and after that build your house" (Proverbs 24:27).

Givers have generous spirits, and they often perceive giving as a way of connecting with other people. Givers use money to provide for the needs of others, but they may be reckless in the amount of their giving or unwise in choosing the beneficiaries of their generosity. Givers may need advice about how to give responsibly and ensure the security of their own households and income. Scripture testifies in many places to the goodness of generous giving, but Jesus spoke in this text to practical wisdom as well as generosity: "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise" (Luke 3:11). Finally, *spenders* find joy and freedom in using the resources God provides to experience life to the fullest. They may be generous in their spending and enjoy letting the benefits of their expenditures extend to others. But this use of money may be addictive, and spenders often need help counting the costs and considering the consequences—now or in the future, especially if expenses exceed income. Jesus offered pragmatic counsel on the principle of spending wisely as well: "For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it?" (Luke 14:28).

You might read these descriptions of the money personalities and immediately locate yourself on the spectrum. Where do you perceive the areas where you need greater balance? If you are uncertain about how and when to begin, find more expansive descriptions of the money personalities in my book *Money on Purpose: Finding a Faith-Filled Balance* (Judson Press, 2012).

Our God is constantly giving to us in many ways. Regardless of how much we earn on our jobs, our income is God's provision. The very air we breathe is provided by God. God has given us family, friends, homes, cars, our senses, laughter, memories, food, clothing, and so much more! Everything we could possibly say we have actually belongs to God. We are entrusted with making use of God's possessions while we are here on earth. What a privilege! What a gift!

Let us each remember this as we manage our finances, for they all belong to God. And God's heart is to make sure that all of creation is cared for. We can help through our finances to make this a reality.

Money with Meaning

When I look at our family budget, I like to ask questions with the "spend, save, give, invest" framework in mind.

During the summer, I *spend* more on groceries when our kids are home from college and we have a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) membership to a local farm. What if this *spending* is actually an *investment*, though, in time eating and conversing together as a family, in the local farming economy, and in food insecure areas near me that also receive produce from the farm?

Sometimes I *save* money by intentionally purchasing inexpensive goods. While often necessary, are there times when this *savings* is a cost for a laborer who receives insufficient compensation for the work they provide? What values might I support if I *spend* and *give* a little more when I can, and in the right circumstances to make an impact?

Rather than striving for a particular point of arrival or amount of money in the bank, considering our money as an expression of our faith continually draws us back to Scripture and to God as our provider.

Faithful in Pastoral Finance

How I Learned to Love Dealing with Money in Ministry (or at Least Hate It Less) Margaret Marcuson

Early in my ministry, I dreaded dealing with stewardship and money matters. I would have been happy to ignore it, to be perfectly honest. I felt called to preach and lead a congregation, but if money weren't a part of it, that would have been fine with me. It was the area of ministry where I felt the least competent.

Little by little, I did learn to feel competent, and even to love dealing with money. Remember, the Bible says, "The love of money is a root of all kinds of evil" (1 Timothy 6:10), not money itself. Loving this area of ministry is not the same as loving money itself!

Here are the ways I learned to love it.

1. *I decided to learn more about it.* I didn't love this part of ministry, but I knew I wanted to *understand* money better because I knew it was part of my job. The more competent I became, the easier it was to love dealing with money matters.

You may ask, "What if I don't want to love it? Stewardship is hard. I dread those sermons. The budget meetings are even harder, especially when it comes to my salary." Here are a few ideas:

- Could you lower your aversion to money by 10 percent? Or even 25 percent?
- Could you make it a research project to learn how money works in your church?
- Could you bring this struggle to God in prayer?

2. *I spent time with people who understood money better than I did.* One minister I know created a financial learning plan for herself. I wasn't that organized, however, when something money related came my way, I signed up for it. Over the years, I took several in-person and online stewardship and finance courses that helped me. Finally being able to understand financial reports was a confidence booster for me.

One thing I wish I'd done early in my ministry: find a ministry money mentor. Find someone for whom no question about money is too dumb. It might be a colleague with a financial background or a knowledgeable member of your congregation. Just be sure you choose someone calm and mature. **3.** *I learned to think about money as part of the spiritual life.* Early on, I wanted to get financial and stewardship matters done and over with so I could get back to "real ministry." However, I came to see dealing with money *as* real ministry, vital both for the sake of the congregation as a whole and for the individuals within it.

Many Christians still think of money as a little dirty. We have a dualistic attitude toward it. But many of Jesus' sayings have to do with money, even more than have to do with prayer. As followers of Jesus and leaders in his church, we are called to be more comfortable talking about it than I was.

Think about your own congregation and what you want for them in the relationship between their faith and their money. Many of our people are mired in debt and fearful about retirement or this month's bills. It's important pastoral work to help them deal with these challenges in light of our faith.

4. *I learned more about my family story.* I knew my family history played a part in my resistance to dealing with money. My father grew up extremely poor in the Depression. His grandparents died tragically in circumstances involving money. His parents had different views of money and fought constantly about it.

In my family, money was potentially dangerous, *and* we harbored a deep fear there might not be enough of it. No wonder I wanted to ignore it. However, here's the paradox: the more I explored that complicated history, the more comfortable I felt talking about money.

I also learned about my family's strengths in relation to resources. I learned about the immigrants and pioneers who survived challenges and about the people who gave generously, trusting God to take care of them. This gave me more confidence to ask other people to give generously. I knew it was possible, even for those with limited resources.

Think about your family story in relation to money. Start with what you know already. What do you know about the family patterns of giving, talking about money openly, of saving and spending?

5. *I was persistent and patient.* I've had to be patient with myself over these years. My approach-avoidance relationship with money continues to this day. I've been working on it for decades now. I don't say this to discourage you but simply to provide a reality check. There is no quick fix, especially if

you have a complicated history with money. Be patient and persist.

As you lean in and pay more attention to money at church, show grace to yourself. If you are anxious about money leadership, remember that it took you years to get to this point, and it may take years to make a shift. That's all right. Most things of value take years to accomplish.

Celebrate every step you take, including every time you do these things:

- Review the financial statements before each board meeting (or afterward)
- Participate in a workshop on church finance
- Read a book about money
- Risk asking a question you are afraid is a dumb one
- Ask for a raise, even a tiny one
- Preach a sermon about money midyear instead of waiting for stewardship month

A final recommendation: *find support for yourself.* In addition to finding a money mentor, seek accountability and support. For ten years I was part of a group of women who met monthly to set financial goals for ourselves. The group helped me take actions, both professional and personal, in relation to money that I found hard to do otherwise. Accountability works. Faithful in Prophetic Finance

A Change in Perspective

In an op-ed in *The Washington Post*, Rebecca Solnit suggested that "much of the reluctance to do what climate change requires comes from the assumption that it means trading abundance for austerity, and trading all our stuff and conveniences for less stuff, less convenience."¹

Solnit, a writer and historian, and coeditor of the new anthology *Not Too Late: Changing the Climate Story from Despair to Possibility*, argued that what is required is a change in perspective, one that reframes climate change as an opportunity "to rethink who we are and what we desire."²

"What if we imagined 'wealth' consisting not of the money we stuff into banks or the fossil fuel-derived goods we pile up, but of joy, beauty, friendship, community, closeness to flourishing nature, to good food produced without abuse of labor?" Solnit wrote. "What if we were to think of wealth as security in our environments and societies, and as confidence in a viable future?"³

Solnit's op-ed recalls the groundbreaking environmental justice work of American Baptist pastor and denomina-



tional leader Jitsuo Morikawa (1912–1987). Morikawa made a significant contribution to this field by articulating an understanding of environmental justice rooted in Christian theology and ethics.

Prior to World War II, Morikawa served three Japanese American congregations in the Los Angeles area. During the war, he was forcibly relocated to the Poston Internment Camp in southwestern Arizona. He preached for one and a half years in the camp and relocation center.

From 1944 to 1956 Morikawa was pastor of the First Baptist Church in Chicago. After that he served 19 years with American Baptist Churches USA, first as director of evangelism and later as associate executive secretary. He challenged American Baptists to redirect their evangelism toward the world at large and encouraged churches to be concerned with the corporate and social, as well as the personal and individual, dimensions of life. Morikawa wrote, "To be human, to live life in salvation, to live life in Christ, is to live as a fair and responsible steward of God, which means a new standard of living, a life of maximum meaning based on minimal consumption to insure equity of distribution and protection of future generations still unborn."⁴

Morikawa was prescient. "The twin issues around which the world's future seems to revolve are the issues of ecology and justice," he wrote. "Ecology pointing to humanity's dependence on nature, and justice, its dependence on neighbor."⁵

Morikawa understood both sin and salvation to be collective, corporate conditions. "Salvation is a corporate well-being and to the extent that all are blessed, we are individually blessed, and to the extent that not all are blessed we are individually denied blessing."⁶

It is not enough for an individual or a family to succeed if others are not prospering, likewise, for Western nations to enjoy material abundance while others remain mired in poverty. Persistent inequity within and among nations, Morikawa argued, is contrary to God's design for human life.⁷

Morikawa was ahead of his time in discerning the intersectional nature of social justice and ecological wholeness. His efforts were instrumental in bringing these concerns together in the American Baptist emphasis on ecojustice in the early 1970s, and they continue in the work of such organizations as the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility to press companies to do their part to address the climate crisis.

Like a modern-day apostle Paul, Morikawa argued that our stewardship in Christ calls for a new standard of living—one that does not measure the good life by what we consume but rather finds meaning in minimal consumption to insure equity of distribution in the present and protection of the environment for future generations. He was prophetic in his own day and remains so in our time.

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves," Paul wrote to the church in Philippi. "Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others" (Philippians 2:3-4).

Paul did not suggest we ignore our own interests, but rather that our interests are bound up in the interests of others. If we lived more fully into this admonition, considering the intersection of our interests with that of our neighbors and the environment, it would contribute significantly to addressing issues of ecology and justice.

Morikawa understood that a living standard tied to what we acquire and consume is untenable in a world of limited resources and increasing population. A new, more modest standard of living—one that considers the interests of our neighbors and the environment, and that seeks to expand equity of access to the necessities of life for all—is possible. To achieve it will require a change in perspective.

Which brings us back to Solnit's suggestion that we think of wealth not in terms of money and goods but rather in terms of joy, beauty, friendship, and community; that we think of wealth as security in our environments and societies, and confidence in a viable future for all. To this I imagine Morikawa would say, "Amen!"

Investing Responsibly, Stewarding Justly

At ABHMS the prophetic commitment to confront systems that debase personhood, deny justice, and destroy creation is not only reflected in ministry programming but also in the way stewardship of funds is exercised through socially responsible investing (SRI). SRI may include using the following:

- Screens that exclude investments in companies engaged in products and activities such as tobacco, liquor, gambling, pornography, and militarism
- Voting proxies that impact policies and practices of companies held in the investment portfolio
- Shareholder activities such as letter writing, formal and informal dialogue with company management and, when appropriate, filing shareholder resolutions, all with the goal of persuading companies that doing well financially does not have to come at the expense of doing good

The Common Investment Fund (CIF)—where ABHMS endowment investments are held—is an actively managed fund that engages in the full range of SRI activities.
