In these pages, we share that story.



statement of the executive director

As the new executive director of American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) and CEO of Judson Press, I am pleased to present ABHMS' 2015 Annual Report.

statement of the treasurer

your generosity makes it possible for ABHMS to share God's boundless grace



You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God through us.' 2 Corinthians 9:11 (NRSV)

A story of grace and generosity is embedded in ABHMS' 2015 major revenue sources. This story tells the testimony of individuals touched and enriched by the grace of God, then inspired to leave legacies of generosity that would bless those in need, both in and beyond their lifetimes, through the ministries of the Home Mission Societies.

Support and revenue sources totaled \$19,941,587 in 2015, \$358,377, or 1.8 percent lower, than the prior year. Investment and endowment income made up 75.8 percent of this total, continuing to be our most stable source of funding.

Matured gifts from individuals who named ABHMS in their wills or created charitable gift annuities or trusts are reflected in legacies and related income. ABHMS received \$1,267,621 in legacy gifts, \$807,450, or 175 percent higher, than the prior year.

Other contributions totaled \$1,267,599 compared to \$204,034 in the prior year. Included in this amount is \$1,050,000 in grant funding from Lilly Endowment Inc.'s National Initiative to Address Economic Challenges Facing Pastoral Leaders. These funds will enable ABHMS to establish "In Support of Excellence," a program utilizing education, professional coaching and collegial support groups to help alleviate the economic challenges and related stressors faced by American Baptist pastoral leaders.

Operating expenses totaling \$12,151,791 remained flat, considering a decrease of \$16,189 from the 2014 total. Total administrative services expense increased slightly, primarily from several staff retirements and the related costs of transitioning to new leadership. Total net assets—a gauge of an organization's long-term financial strength—decreased 5.2 percent from 2014 or \$9,556,251, primarily because of an increase in net unrealized losses on investments.

The Common Investment Fund's annualized return, net of fees, was -1.8 percent, compared to its -0.4 percent benchmark. Year-to-year market volatility can be expected. However, ABHMS' Finance Committee and Investment Advisory Council continue to pursue a well-managed strategy that emphasizes long-term results through a well-diversified portfolio: Considering three-year, 10-year and "since inception" markers, the portfolio's annualized returns, net of fees, were 8.3 percent, 6.4 percent, and 9.7 percent, respectively.

ABHMS remains committed to faithful stewardship of the funds entrusted to our care. As you read through the pages of this report, you will find stories of individuals, congregations and communities who have been transformed by our ministries focused on cultivating leaders, equipping disciples and healing communities.

We are grateful for the generous support of American Baptist individuals and congregations who make our ministry possible—past, present and future. Whether through gifts of time, talent or treasury, your generosity is causing others to give God praise, as they experience God's boundless grace through the Home Mission Society's ministries.

In 2015, American Baptist Home Mission Societies awarded \$330,000 in scholarships to 219 undergraduate, 93 seminarian, seven graduate and eight doctoral students.

Ninety-eight new ministry professionals enrolled in American Baptist Personnel Services (ABPS), which supported 30 American Baptist regions by completing 326 database searches for candidates to fill open ministry positions and creating more than 12,000 candidate profiles for search committees.

Centro de Capacitación para Líderes del Siglo XXI (CECALI XXI), or "Training Center for 21st Century Leaders," was implemented in California, Arizona and Illinois. The project trained 129 Latino pastors and lay leaders, providing practical tools for effective ministry that is transforming churches and communities.

Intercultural Ministries provided planning and coordination services to the Haitian Alliance for its leadership planning meeting and ABHMS staff presentations at a Karen women's conference as well as a gathering of seven New Jersey Asian churches for sharing ministries and fellowship.

CECALI training helps new church serve community



The Rev. Jaime Flores and his wife, Andrea, planted a new church in February 2015 in Indianapolis, Ind. By the end of the year, Iglesia Bautista Betesda had an average Sunday attendance of 35. The church launched an English as a Second Language (ESL) program that quickly grew to 79 registered participants, with average weekly attendance ranging from 35-40 students. The program is so successful that it's considered a model by local media and governmental

officials. CECALI training, provided by ABHMS, helped Flores to understand the importance of community ministries like ESL classes, he says.

Delegates journey to southeast Asia in name of peace, justice

A delegation of eight people from a number of American Baptist regions and American Baptist Home Mission Societies, together with Karen Baptist Churches USA and Chin Baptist Churches USA, took part in a "peace and justice" advocacy trip in January and February 2015.

The group visited the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees in Kuala Lumpur and Bangkok and traveled to Myitkyina, Kachin State, to visit four Internal Displaced People (IDP) camps, where more than 100,000 refugees are seeking refuge. In a meeting with the Kachin State minister (governor) in Myitkyina,

delegation members expressed concerns about the IDP camps and requested action toward "peace and justice" for those displaced. U.S. embassies in Bangkok and Rangoon were additional important stops, where the group shared concerns about continuous human rights violations, urging embassy pressure on the government to end violations.

During time with 1991 Nobel Peace Prize winner Daw Aung San Suu Kyi in her Parliament office, delegates engaged in dialogue about the country's ethnic persecution, the political state and the November election.

Sharing burdens, lightening the load

At a presentation to a clergy association about advance directives and hospice, the Rev. Kathleen Busby, an American Baptist-endorsed hospice chaplain, talked about end-of-life decisions, weaving religious, spiritual and cultural beliefs into how one moves through the process of determining the types of interventions an individual may wish to receive prior to death.

A pastor started to cry. After having spent the past hour talking about death, he found himself so filled with emotion that he needed to share the fact that three of his congregants had been shot and killed over the preceding five months. He didn't know with whom to speak about his grief; as a pastor, he wanted to remain strong for his congregants but often didn't know where to turn. Other clergy—including a rabbi and a Buddhist monk—chimed in, talking about the burdens they carried. Busby listened, facilitated and suggested possible resources. Then she led the group in prayer as they shared each other's burdens, lightening their loads and recognizing the cost of discipleship, as it were. It was truly a blessing because each was healed in some small way that day.

Bringing spiritual guidance to a combat zone

In the Joint Task Force (JTF) section of Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, that provides housing and security for detainees, American Baptist-endorsed Navy Reserve Commander Gary Bennett, JTF Command Chaplain, oversees and leads chaplains representing more than 10 different Christian denominations. He ensures the representation and practice of faith for all service men and women and detainees in accordance with military guidelines and First Amendment rights for faith and religion.

One of his greatest and most challenging responsibilities is to provide spiritual guidance and support to the service men and women—including prison guards,


growth, Bennett conducts and oversees several church services, multiple Bible studies throughout the week, morale-building activities and worship services.

More than 600 chaplains and pastoral counselors, endorsed through ABHMS, bring hope and healing in countless settings.

equipping disciples broadening the understan

In 2015, American Baptist Home Mission Societies offered Missional Church Learning Experience community presentations to 40 participants in three inperson sessions and four virtual sessions. Missional church presentations were also shared through preaching, speaking and workshop engagements with more than 1,500 people in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Michigan, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

More than 5,000 2015 Discipleship Planning Guides were mailed to regions and churches: "The Bible—A Light for Our Path," included a month-by-month planning calendar, the Revised Standard Lectionary, Christian education tips and resources, articles from experts about teaching the Bible to children, and a litany for Christian Education Sunday in Chinese, Spanish, English and French. More than 400 additional requests were filled.



The five-part Bible study "Children, Poverty and the Bible" continues to be a popular resource in support of ABHMS' "Justice for Children" efforts: More than 330 requests for the study were filled in 2015.

The 52 free downloadable Workshops for Church Life and Leadership garnered more than 2,000 unique page views. Designed for small groups and leadership training at the congregational, associational and regional levels, the workshops are available in Spanish, French and Karen as well as English.

ABHMS distributed more than \$5,000 in American Baptist Women's Ministries' Refit contributions to church planters and organizations in four American Baptist regions.

About three dozen churches implemented the "Got Style" evangelism method in six American Baptist regions. More than 30 "Got Style" workshops were conducted on local, association and region levels across the country, and the "Got Style" personality-based process was further developed for use in the ABPS search process to examine the complement and contrast of potential candidate and congregation matches.

Michigan church 'better as a result of MCLE model of prayer, planning, implementation'

Our Missional Church Learning Experience (MCLE) project, "Balancing Your College Life," gathers Michigan State University students around food, worship and the Word on Sunday nights.

The ongoing missional emphasis has produced a seminarian now studying at Duke, a Ph.D. candidate at Purdue and a doctor of ministry graduate from Northern Baptist Theological Seminary. Also, our "Balancing Your College Life" coordinator took lessons learned from this work and began a career as an elementary educator in the Detroit area.

This MCLE work—inspired by the training offered by ABHMS—has also birthed projects in other parts of the church. The largest and most radical result was suspension of the church constitution. We realized that our governance structures weren't helpful in providing the flexibility required by the MCLE model. When we held the benefit of "Balancing Your College Life" against the benefit of continuing with our same governance structure, we voted to suspend the constitution. Our vote launched a second MCLE season of prayer, fasting, listening and discernment. After months of living in Christian community, listening to our neighbors and praying for the Holy Spirit's dominance in our lives, a different governance model was discovered.



Through a reading list provided by the MCLE program, we connected with John Kaiser's book "Winning On Purpose: How to Organize Congregations to Succeed in Their Mission," and adopted Kaiser's model of governance with great results. Many questions remain unanswered, and much work remains to be done. We are, however, better as a result of the MCLE model of prayer, planning and implementation.

Gospel study with 'missional twist' impacts faith communities, neighborhoods

In collaboration with the Rev. Sam Brink, minister of Church Resources and Mission Support for American Baptist Churches of Wisconsin, ABHMS created and implemented the "Mission from the Gospels" resource and leadership training program in several regions, associations and churches across the United States, including New York, Wisconsin, Kansas, Minnesota and Ohio.

This study of the gospels with a "missional twist" has impacted faith communities and their neighborhoods. In American Baptist Churches of New York



State's Capital Area Baptist Association, churches formed mission teams that studied and applied the teaching of the gospels in and with their neighboring communities. As part of the training, the association created six teams. Each team explored and engaged in mission together within these focus areas: partnering with the Saratoga Spring race track ministry; creating health care kits; partnering with an urban congregation's food ministry; creating a clearinghouse

ministry to connect people in need with resources; and creating a community meal ministry. Each team has access to "seed money" from the association.

"The needs are great," said the Rev. George Stefani, association leader. "The size of the need can paralyze people. So we tend not to do anything. But Jesus said, 'Go and see what you have to give." The association is attempting to do just that as it listens to neighbors in need and reflects on the teachings of the gospels.

healing communities | we believe the power of

During 2015, Volunteer Mobilization Ministries facilitated the placement of more than 650 volunteers—who served 3,245 days—across the United States. Close to 240 volunteers logged more than 7,100 hours during ABHMS' annual "Home Mission: 'Til the Work is Done" in New Orleans, still recovering from the devastation wrought by hurricanes Katrina and Rita. These volunteers, representing 28 churches, colleges and universities in 20 states and Puerto Rico, completed more than 40 projects, including cleaning and tagging 80-plus storm drains on a 2½-mile stretch of road. In a joint effort of ABHMS and American Baptist Churches of New Jersey, 60 volunteers logged close to 2,400 hours during the two-week "Coming Together for New Jersey...Rebuild, Renew and Restore" work weeks, a Hurricane Sandy recovery effort.

Disaster Response Ministries awarded One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) **Emergency Disaster grants totaling \$58,000** that assisted local churches and regional offices responding to natural disasters, including flooding and mudslides in the Pacific Northwest, fires in California, damage from extreme



winter storms in Massachusetts, Michigan and Wisconsin, and flooding in Wyoming, New York and Ohio. ABHMS also assisted a church vandalized in Nebraska and provided assistance to two Massachusetts camps, Grotonwood and Oceanwood. Other American Baptist regions receiving assistance included Central Pacific Coast, Growing Healthy Churches, Northwest, Rocky Moun-

tains, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nebraska, New York State, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Delaware, and Wisconsin. Grants awarded to national partners Church World Service and American Baptist Men USA assisted in their respective response as well.

OGHS Domestic Development Grants distributed by Disaster Response Ministries totaled \$280,907.84. Examples of ministries that received funds include: Community organizers in Massachusetts and Ohio addressing lowwage issues and immigration; a community mission organization in New York focused on strengthening faith services; hunger, shelter and refugee/immigration programs in the Growing Healthy Churches, Nebraska, Ohio and Pennsylvania and Delaware regions; support of construction of a new well and filtration system at Redwood Glen Camp and Conference Center within American

Baptist Churches of the Central Pacific Coast region; and kitchen and classroom expansion along with an anti-hunger project at two ABHMS-related Christian centers in Billings, Mont., and Peoria, Ill.

Twenty-one Justice for Children grants totaling \$48.500 were awarded in 2015. The projects—from Maine to Florida to California and many points in between—addressed a breadth of needs, including mentorship of children



of incarcerated parents, after-school programs and summer camps. One of the recipients. Warrensville Road Community Based Center of Life, Maple Heights, Ohio, received funds for its after-school program and Children's Defense Fund Summer Freedom School program. Through this outreach of

Warrensville Road Community Baptist Church, 70 youth ages 8-18 learned to set high learning goals and develop and visualize plans for their future through vision boards.

Ex-offender Re-entry Ministries presented 12 workshops attended by more than 250 participants in eight regions. "Train the trainer" certifications—preparing participants to train more trainers for church and community re-entry ministries—were earned by 21 individuals. As part of the Interfaith Criminal Justice Coalition, ABHMS participated in eight advocacy efforts supporting prison reform. Two camps for children of incarcerated parents—in Ohio and California—ministered to 38 children with support from ABHMS.

At the American Psychiatric Association's annual meeting in Toronto, Canada, ABHMS helped to launch two new mental health resources for faith leaders: "Mental Health: A Guide for Faith Leaders" and a "Quick Reference Guide." These resources were developed through the Mental Health and Faith Community Partnership, which ABHMS helped establish through its involvement with the Interfaith Disability Advocacy Coalition, a program of American Association of People with Disabilities.

Christian love can—and will—change the world

The light I never saw coming

When I stepped into the stifling August heat on my first day in New Orleans, I had no idea that, by the end of the week, my thirst for the Holy Spirit would be quenched.

I pray for God's presence in my life, but when He shows Himself, I often find myself fighting His plan. My idea of a mission trip is drastically different now compared to prior to my New Orleans experience. I used to think that, by going on a mission trip, I would become somewhat of a messiah for people in need of saving; and to achieve this status, I would perform immense acts of work, such as rebuilding destroyed homes.

I learned quickly that my plans for the mission trip and the plans God had already determined for me were far from congruent. If I wanted to be like Jesus, I had to do what He did, which was serve others unselfishly in love.

By learning to see the spiritual value in doing less "glorious" tasks—such as painting a front porch railing or pulling weeds from a garden—God showed me that what matters most it is not the size of the work you do, but rather the spirit with which you do it.

Ephesians 2:10 says that, as Christians, we are called to do the tasks that God has planned for us. By carrying out His will, we not only please Him, but we also shine His light into the darkest places of the Earth. I pray that the work I did in New Orleans will be eternal proof to those I served that I represent a God whose very essence is love.



Finding a way past pain to healing, hope

At the ABHMS-supported Los Angeles camp for children of incarcerated parents, staff witnessed sad and insecure children transformed into artists, singers and performers. The children laughed, shared stories and, most of all, made friends. Brother and sister Carlos and Maria, whose parents are incarcerated, became good friends with siblings Tyrone and Shamika, whose father is in prison. After returning from camp, Carlos and Maria asked their grandmother whether their friends could join them for Sunday dinner. Tyrone and Shamika's mother agreed to the shared meal. Such friendships are crucial for children's healing.

In 2015, the Judson Press bookstore and exhibit traveled to 14 locations, including national and regional events, and 18 American Baptist regions participated in the "Regional Rewards" program, awarding 10 percent of online retail sales to churches in their regions.

Judson Press published four quarters of "Judson Bible Journeys for Adults," the American Baptist-written Christian education curriculum, in 2015, **providing study books to more than 16,000 students**.



Judson Press published four quarters of "The Secret Place," **its devotional guide with a worldwide readership of more than 250,000** in standard, large print and Braille editions. Each daily devotion includes a Scripture passage, an original meditation and a brief prayer written by Christian writers across the nation.

Thanks to more than \$2,000 in customer donations for shipping, Judson Press sent close to 6,000 free copies of "The Secret Place" and Bibles to prisoners and others in need.

- "Design Your Community Ministry Program from Scratch," facilitated by Joy F. Skjegstad, author of "7 Creative Models for Community Ministry"
- "Spiritual Practices for Effective Leadership," facilitated by Debora Jackson, author of "Spiritual Practices for Effective Leadership: 7 Rs of Sanctuary for Pastors"

Gift certificates were provided to 220 students who received ABHMS scholarships.

The youth used the monies earned to help pay their way the following month to Los Angeles, where they cooked food at shelters and played bingo at nursing homes, among other mission service activities.





ABHMS' commitment to faithful stewardship includes investing assets with the goal of maximizing financial returns, while also utilizing our power as shareholders to hold corporations accountable to social and environmental concerns.

Through partnership with the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility (ICCR), ABHMS has historically pressed companies such as General Electric, ExxonMobil and Tyson Foods Inc. to improve their sustainability practices and change the way they address environmental, social and governance risks. Through dialogue, we have helped to educate companies on their impacts and worked with them to devise and implement innovative strategies that have affected positive systemic change.

Change has not come overnight. But through faith and perseverance, ABHMS dares to believe that, in partnership with others, we can continue to impact the corporate world in ways that support sustainable development, which the UN defines as "meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs."

Highlights of 2015 shareholder engagements include:

■ ABHMS continues to engage with Tyson Foods Inc. on water stewardship because of a history of water contamination incidents—both within Tyson's own facilities



and among contract farmers who raise animals. In 2015, we led other co-filers in a share-holder resolution calling for the company to implement a water-stewardship policy that outlines leading practices to improve water quality for all companyowned facilities as well as facilities under contract to Tyson. The resolution was supported by 10.8 percent of shareholders at Tyson's annual meeting. Collec-



tively representing \$2.6 trillion in assets under management, ABHMS and other Ceres investors requested disclosure through CDP Water. The company indicated that it will begin disclosing to CDP.

- Along with other entities, ABHMS co-filed a resolution requesting that ExxonMobil reduce greenhouse gas emissions in both operations and products. Additional ABHMS-led dialogues in February and March 2015 focused on emission reductions. Support for the resolution fell significantly, dropping to 9.6 percent from 22 percent in 2014. ABHMS will draft a follow-up resolution for 2016 that presents the moral case for action on climate change and asks the company to adopt a policy acknowledging the imperative to limit warming to 2 degrees Celsius.
- ABHMS continues to engage with major financial institutions to promote a culture of ethics and responsible risk management. Together with ICCR, ABHMS encouraged Bank of America to develop the business standards report "How We Live Our Purpose." In July 2015, investors participated in meetings with executives at the bank and reviewed a draft of the report to provide feedback before its planned March 2016 release.


