Space for Grace to offer renewal, art, take-home skills

American Baptist Home Mission Societies' (ABHMS) "Space for Grace: Thy Will Be Done" urban retreat Nov. 14-16 in Philadelphia promises a variety of ways for participants to experience grace, reflection, refreshment and renewal in addition to faith-inspired art and performances as well as take-home skills to be applied in local contexts.

Each daily worship experience will focus on its own "Thy Will Be Done" theme based on the Lord's Prayer. Participants in Friday evening's intercultural Communion will be invited to come forward to receive the Bread and Cup in distinctly unique ways.

A chapel/quiet room will be hosted by the Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that provides resources for contemplative and prayerful living.

Live performances will include Christian singer/songwriters, Christian hip-hop, a live podcast and a multidisciplinary act (poetry, song, dance, storytelling and music). Exhibits will include weavers from Myanmar (formerly known as Burma); abstract, acrylic and water color paintings; black-and-white landscape photographs; pencil, pen and ink drawings; wood working; The Christian Citizen magazine; "Game & Word" (youth Bible study meets Xbox); and "Design & Word" (youth Bible study paired with fashion design). A diverse array of learning experiences will include the following: "Leadership Lessons for the Good: Realizing Transformation from Oppression," "Sacred Resistance: Creating and Supporting Spiritual Changemakers," "When Life Doesn't Seem Worth Living: Congregations' Role in Suicide Prevention," "Preparing Congregations for Ministries of Advocacy and Social Action," "Drama, Intimacy & Vulnerability: Spiritual Challenges of Digital Culture" and "Music that Makes Community: Singing Together Heals the World."

ABHMS announces new 'Rebuilding, Restoring, Renewing Puerto Rico' fundraising goal

As its ongoing "Rebuilding, Restoring, Renewing Puerto Rico" initiative enters its second year, ABHMS announces a new \$1 million One Great Hour of Sharing 2018-2019 fundraising goal in partnership with American Baptist Churches USA. The initiative ultimately seeks to raise \$5 million over five years.

Thanks to generous contributions of those in and outside the American Baptist family, \$1,367,944.30 was raised as of Sept. 20. By Feb. 9, \$1,012,946.04 had been collected, surpassing the initial \$1 million fundraising goal.

Approximately \$404,500 was provided to entities in Puerto Rico, including the American Baptist Churches of Puerto Rico region; churches; Corporación Milagros del Amor; schools; Centro de Retiro Genesaret; and missionaries. Included in the total are funds



that were provided for community grants; purchase of supplies; and renovations at Centro de Retiro Ruth Maldonado, which provides volunteer housing.

From Jan. 1 to Aug. 31, 30 teams and nine individuals—totaling 370 volunteers—served in churches and other facilities. Eleven more teams are slated to volunteer through December. Seventeen volunteer teams have registered for 2019.

ABHMS addresses spiritual, psychological needs in Texas

ABHMS' Rev. Dr. Patricia Murphy and Rev. Florence Li visited Texas to minister to clergy and other residents who have continued to feel abandoned one year after Hurricane Harvey.

Murphy represented her role as ABHMS national coordinator of Chaplaincy and Specialized Ministries. Li brought to bear her experience with displaced people from her



ABHMS Intercultural Ministries role with immigrants and refugees. Both used skills in healing trauma.

At New St. John Missionary Baptist Church, Port Arthur, and at Borden Chapel, Beaumont, the pair engaged pastoral leaders who have been struggling themselves while

striving to minister to suffering parishioners. Those experiencing depression were uplifted with prayers and reminded of the need for spiritual self-care.

Later the same day, Murphy and Li returned to New St. John Missionary Baptist to facilitate a meeting of neighborhood residents, many of whom had been displaced by the hurricane. Already reeling from the storm, some homeowners were repeatedly wounded when the Federal Emergency Management Agency rejected their claims and when they fell prey to contractor scams.

"People left the meeting saying they were going to give up, but now they have hope," Murphy says. "It was good to bring people together to encourage them to navigate like the firstcentury church, where everything was done in community."
