Dear Mission Partner,

Thanks to your America for Christ (AFC) Offering contributions, American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) supported communities distressed by the devastation of COVID-19 last year, as the pandemic swept our country and Puerto Rico. We helped families who lost homes to floods, wildfires and storms, along with children living on the edge because of poverty, and seminarians preparing to devote their lives to sharing the Good News. These are just a few of the ways we minister to those in need; there are many more.

We have been answering God's call to heal broken families and communities—as well as cultivate strong Christian leaders and equip passionate disciples since 1832.

The world's needs today are as great as they were close to two centuries ago. By awarding grants to mission partners also doing the work of healing broken families and communities with the healing power of God's love, we increase the numbers of those in need who receive support across the United States and Puerto Rico, at the same time increasing the impact of your AFC gifts.

So, when you contribute to AFC, you increase our capacity to fulfill the biblical mandate in Ephesians 4:11-13: "Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service."

Our America for Christ Offering 2021 campaign— "For the Purpose of Equipping Saints," based on Ephesians 4:11-13—focuses on our discipleship and leadership empowerment ministries, which nurture the faithful followers who find their call and life's work as the hands and feet of Christ.

ABHMS' Discipleship Ministries sends more than 5,000 Discipleship and Christian Education Guides to regions, churches and individuals annually and provides 62 Church Life and Leadership workshops in English, Spanish, French and Karen, available for download at abhms.org. On average, more than 1,000 Bible studies—ranging in subjects from stewardship and eco-justice to children in povertyare distributed each year, and, in 2019, several hundred

American Baptists attended discipleship workshops addressing the church's viability in these changing times.

Our Leadership Empowerment work in 2019 broadened a three-year Lilly Endowment grant focused on fostering clergy financial literacy, health and wholeness. More than 35 ministry partners and ABHMS staff were trained to integrate a related toolkit—adaptable for native populations, speakers of languages other than English and people living with disabilities—into a variety of congregational and community ministries.

Chaplaincy, Pastoral Counseling and Specialized Ministries developed a three-phase plan to strengthen connections of its ministry professionals as they combat denominational isolation.

And a two-year integrative program for missional entrepreneurs, Co-Creators Incubator, was launched last year. The inaugural cohort fostered a spirit of collegiality and collaboration among six entrepreneurs creating innovative ministries in the name of Jesus, while providing resources to enhance their ministries. Each received a \$3,000 seed grant, hands-on training at two summits in King of Prussia, Pa., mentorship from an interdisciplinary team and monthly virtual meetings with experts to help their ventures flourish and grow.

On behalf of American Baptist Home Mission Societies, thank you for your past generous support of our transformational mission. Our ministries, along with the ministries of our mission partners, are making a difference in the lives of so many individuals and families. With your help, we can bring God's healing touch to so many more.

Biblical reflection: In different rooms

Like many other children around the nation, my 8-year-old daughter is attending second grade virtually this fall because of the global pandemic. While this presents many challenges for her and for me, one upside is that I get a more thorough understanding of the gifts of her teacher and classmates, as I eavesdrop on their instructional interactions.

Ephesians declares that the Creator of the cosmos, the Giver of life itself, has brought us redemption and has given us belonging in the body of Christ.

Sometimes these interactions are hilarious, like the Monday when I heard her classmate complain about the unfairness of having five days during the week and only two days for the weekend. At other times, their conversations alert me to matters more poignant than funny. Last week, I heard the teacher explaining a math lesson on place value with the following words: "Even if your classmate is in another room, they're still a member of this class." It is so clear to second graders: Belonging isn't geographically bound.

Questions of belonging and geography were among the most salient matters for the early Christian community. In that instance, members were not in different rooms or even in different homes; they were in different countries and of different nationalities, language and cultural groups, and ethnicities. Yet God had made these disparate and disconnected people one holy community, one people and one body, through the grace and love of Jesus Christ exemplified in the cross. The letter to the Ephesians proclaims this cosmic reality, challenging the church then and now to live up to its meaning and to walk worthy of this high calling.

Further, Ephesians declares that the Creator of the cosmos, the Giver of life itself, has brought us redemption and has given us belonging in the body of Christ. And within that body, the Giver has placed particular charisms embodied in apostles, prophets, evangelists, and pastors and teachers, who equip the saints for the work of ministry and acts of service that build up the body, so that the community can be whole and growing. Ultimately, when the body of Christ functions as it ought, every part of the body nurtures and nourishes every other part. All of us—whatever kind of cell we are, in whatever part of the body we reside—build up and grow up until we reach the full measure of Christ's maturity.

Throughout the New Testament, we learn that the earliest Christian congregations expressed their connectedness and community by means of mutual aid. The local church assisted individuals in need and so built the connection. Scattered congregations in one region assisted congregations in crisis in other regions and so strengthened the sense that there is one universal church, one body in Christ.

Through our gifts today, in a time of crisis and division, we, too, exhibit this core value. Mirroring the grace of the One who has called us to live lives filled with gratitude, we extend generosity and love in material and tangible ways to signify the common spiritual bond we enjoy. We incarnate the proclamation that we are one. We are in different rooms but no less a part of the same household—members, indeed, of the same body.

We claim the promise that no weapon formed against you or your church shall prosper.

We pray that you would heal us from within. As modern believers cede their witness to gain political power and hand over 30 pieces of silver for seats in the courts, call us again to the waters of the Jordan to hear the cry, "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is near." Flip over our tables and drive out our money-changers if you must, so that we will no longer neglect "the weightier matters of the law."

Meanwhile, for those who lead our churches, we give. For those who blaze new trails in ministry, we give. For those who give hope to our children and comfort the afflicted, we give. For all the foot washers and fishers of people, we give. We thank you for continuing to take our small offerings of bread and fish and multiplying them to feed the multitudes.

It is in Christ's name and for His sake we pray. Amen.

Stories from the mission field: Discipleship

Gifts to AFC support ABHMS' Discipleship Ministries

Even in the midst—or especially in the midst—of the COVID-19 pandemic, the persistence of kingdom ministry is essential. Your gifts to America for Christ (AFC) support ABHMS' ministries of discipleship in the quest to equip people for the work of faith-initiation (evangelism) and faith formation (Christian education).

In the spring of 2020, the Rev. Dr. Jeff Johnson, ABHMS national coordinator of evangelism and discipleship, provided Got Style?* training on natural ways to share the gospel to five dozen core clergy, key church leaders and general laity from the Kachin Baptist Churches of America. Unable to gather in person, participants across the country connected online for multiple hours of inspiration and instruction.



Prior to the co-currently translated sessions, materials were provided in Burmese, using the same Bible that Adoniram Judson translated 200 years ago. Our God-given diversity was represented across age and gender within this one Asian diaspora community. Only an organization like ABHMS could bring together such a group.

How can a church grow young followers of Jesus and deepen their faith over a lifetime? That is the question being addressed by a network of churches from across the nation, as part of ABHMS' "Growing Young" initiative. Based on extensive research conducted by Fuller Youth

Institute, teams from each church learn key practices critical for growing young people in faith and keeping them involved in faith communities over their lifetime. Coordinated by the Rev. Dr. Christine Roush, ABHMS national coordinator of faith formation and discipleship, and led by Jake Mulder, Fuller's executive director of Leadership Formation, the Growing Young initiative has gathered teams from 30 churches stretching from Oregon to West Virginia. The teams learn both the practices crucial to faith formation and strategies for implementing those practices within their faith communities.

Through the Contextualized Ministry Pilot—a partnership with the American Baptist Churches of the South (ABCOTS), led by the Rev. Dr. Eddie Cruz, ABHMS national coordinator of congregational mission and discipleship, and ABHMS' Roush—ABHMS is seeing the power of contextualizing the gospel for reinvigorating congregations in local mission. Examples shared in a recent Zoom webinar, which was attended by 34 key pastoral leaders, include:

- Dr. Jean Robinson-Casey spoke about an ecumenical car protest initiated by Martin Luther King Christian Church, Reston, Va., in the city's largest parking lot. More than 200 carloads of devoted folks rallied to denounce recent unjust shooting and killings.
- The Rev. Bruce Carroll shared that the hospitality team of Antioch Baptist Church, Shreveport, La., provided thank you notes and lunch to first responders. Recipients, essential workers who are often unrecognized, included IT departments of the city and schools and nursing home cleaning staff. The church also hosted an ecumenical prayer walk, during which participants made their way through the city, pausing to pray at key locations, such as hospitals, city government buildings and police stations.

Dr. James Harrison, executive minister of ABCOTS, remarked after the meeting, "How refreshing to hear about local church ministries cultivating their members, who are cultivating their communities."

ABHMS' Co-Creators **Incubator supports innovative** thinkers, entrepreneurs

An abundance of fresh ideas wafts through our churches. Innovative thinkers feverishly scribble ideas into notepads. Mission-minded leaders constantly discover new ways to impact their communities for good. Through its



Co-Creators Incubator (CCI), American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) brings together missional entrepreneurs for a two-year integrative program that helps grow ministry ideas into viable ventures with a Christ-centered mission. "The program is intentional, relevant

and practical, providing all the tools you need to continue in your venture and surrounding you with a supportive community," writes Alyssa Vasquez, a Co-Creator from the first cycle of CCI. "The ABHMS staff have made it clear that they are not only investing in my venture, YouBelong, LLC, but also in me, simply as Alyssa Vasquez. The staff and this program will always be a part of my story and my journey as a CEO and a missional entrepreneur."

ABHMS' Chaplaincy & Specialized Ministries cares for caregivers


ABHMS' Chaplaincy & Specialized Ministries calls us to provide spiritual support and counselling to those who find themselves in some of the most vulnerable times, as they strive to provide support to others who are struggling. Those who are called to chaplaincy, pastoral counseling and other related ministries are often forgotten. "It's been a hard season, and last week was one of my hardest in quite a while," shares endorsed chaplain the Rev. Joy Freeman, BCC, after a monthly ABHMS check-in Zoom call with chaplains and pastoral counselors. "It seemed every patient and staff member I cared for was struggling with deep pain and suffering. I found myself present to grief, despair, hopelessness, weariness, frustration, anger—basically all the big, hard, suffering, drenched feelings. There was no respite for me."

ABHMS' In Support of Excellence teaches pastors about financial well-being

ABHMS' In Support of Excellence is a one-year, cohort learning experience for pastors that combines the personal, pastoral and prophetic dimensions of money. In addition to focusing on their own financial well-being, participating pastors are equipped to be financial resources in their congregations and communities. After hosting a virtual financial education series in Savannah, Ga., offering both practical and theological resources on money matters, Rev. Lolita Hickman said, "Sound money and other resource management is one of the most valuable life skills the Church can teach. Jesus taught many lessons about stewardship, urging believers to use our God-given gifts talents, time and treasure—in ways that please God and help our fellow persons."

Endowed gift to bless two African American female pastors yearly

Restoration Ministries of Greater Cleveland Inc. has blessed American Baptist Home Mission Societies' with



a \$70,000 endowed gift. "When we sold our building, the Lord blessed us with a decent sum of money," says Rev. Christine A. Smith, the church's senior pastor and author of "Beyond the Stained-Glass Ceiling: Equipping & Empowering Female Pastors" (Judson Press, 2013). The endowment, aptly


named the Beyond the Stained-Glass Ceiling Endowment, will support at least two African American female pastors yearly who serve congregations of 300 or fewer members as senior solo pastor.

Weiss Scholarships aid college students

Cerise Barton of Federal Way, Wash., and Kurt Kaufman of Denver have been named recipients of the prestigious Daniel E. Weiss Scholarships, administered by ABHMS. Barton is attending Candler School of Theology, Atlanta, while Kaufman is attending Central Baptist Theological Seminary, Shawnee, Kan.

Promoting the America for Christ Offering 2021 in your church

- **1.** Gather a team or taskforce for the America for Christ (AFC) 2021 home mission offering.
- **2.** Determine a three-month schedule for promotions.



- 3. Review the enclosed materials. Then visit abhms.org, click "Learn More" in the America for Christ box, and then click "Resources" to access the AFC videos and downloadable resources. If you need more printed materials, please contact Kim Wilkins at kim.wilkins@abhms.org or 610.768.2413. The videos will be available at abhms.org after Jan. 1, 2021.
- 4. Set a goal to assist American Baptist Home Mission Societies in raising \$1,000,000 that supports home mission throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. Gather an AFC offering prayer team and meet once weekly before worship for five minutes of prayer.

- **5.** Meet with the pastor and/or church's leadership team to share the promotions schedule.
- **6.** Incorporate "Mission Moments" into worship. Each Sunday for a month, take three to five minutes during worship to present a Mission Moment. The updates can include showing the AFC videos, reading an insert or allowing testimony from individuals who have volunteered for a home mission team or participated in any other kind of training or workshop. The videos will be available at abhms.org after Jan. 1, 2021.
- 7. Invite a home mission staff member as a speaker to your church. Please complete the virtual speaker-request form included in the AFC packet, visit the website and download the form, or call the ABHMS Development office at 610.768.2420.
- 8. Involve children and youth during a Mission Moment. Ask them to help pick up the offering during worship and distribute AFC bulletin inserts. While inserts can be included in the bulletin, you may, instead, want to highlight them during the Mission Moment, allowing the youth to distribute them to the congregation.
- 9. Have fun. Design an AFC Offering 2021 bulletin board. Include materials from the offering packet. Allow the children and youth to add art that conveys ideas from the "For the Purpose of Equipping Saints" theme.
- **10.** Record and celebrate your progress. Use a Sunday in March to hold a celebration and to THANK the congregation for their generous support and for meeting the goal!
- **11.** Complete the AFC evaluation form (pages 11-12) and return it to American Baptist Home Mission Societies.

How can I support AFC 2021?

You can give during the congregational offering Sunday at your church, or you can give an individual gift online by visiting abhms.org/AFCnow. Also, consider encouraging your congregation's Mission Committee to include an America for Christ Offering contribution in its annual budget.

How is my gift making a difference?

Your generous AFC gifts support our mission—connecting our partners to cultivate leaders and equip disciples who bring healing and transformation to communities across our nation and Puerto Rico. Your contributions share God's love by:



"To Live in God Reflection Guide"





Ministry Focus: Evangelism

Begin by reading Genesis 21:1-20. Ishmael was the "other" child. Born to Abram through a servant named Hagar, Ishmael was thrice marginalized: by age, by social status as the son of a slave, and by ethnicity as the son of an Egyptian slave. Genesis 12-25 focuses on Israel's ancestors, with chapters 21-22 telling the story of the childhood of Ishmael's half-brother, Isaac. Isaac was the son who fulfilled God's promise to Abraham and Sarah of a child from whom a great nation would descend. Wedged into that purposeful narrative of the esteemed child come 13 verses that tell of the "other" child. That his story will not be denied—that it insists on being told—is remarkable in itself.


